




The Scopes Trial

· John Scopes, a Tennessee teacher, taught his students about Charles Darwin's theory of evolution in violation of state law.

Dayton teacher and football coach John Scopes, seen here during sentencing, was fined \$100 on July 21, 1925.



· The Klan targeted immigrants, Catholics, Jews, and African-Americans.







The Ku Klux Klan reached its greatest strength in the 1920's, with a membership of over three million people.

· Many African-Americans moved north during and after World War I in search of factory jobs.




Jacob Lawrence, The Migration Series (Panel 1)



1960 African American population




· While many found jobs, they also found racism and resentment from whites that competed with them for jobs.


Irish population of the United States: 1920 – 11%


1930 Total Population - 123,202,624
